


New Mexico

Getting to Know Our Supreme Officers!

Luanne Walton, Supreme Recorder

I was born in Halifax, Nova Scotia and grew up in Moncton, New Brunswick. I received a Bachelor of Arts from Kings College and a law degree from the Dalhousie School of Law. Between my arts degree and law school, I studied French immersion at Laval University in Quebec City, Quebec.

I was fortunate to be chosen as a clerk to a judge of the Federal Court of Appeal in Ottawa, Ontario. I stayed in Ottawa after my one year clerkship ended and have lived there ever since, with a brief sojourn in Halifax, Nova Scotia 1996-98. I worked as a constitutional lawyer with the Canadian Department of Justice for thirty-one years. It was a wonderful career. During the early 2000s, I earned my Masters in Constitutional Law from York University. I was involved in court cases dealing with all aspects of the financial regulation in Canada, including banking, securities reform, and regulation of the banking system. Additionally, I worked on high profile cases involving same sex marriage, the status of aboriginal persons, Canadian unity, marijuana reform, and federal greenhouse gas regulation. My single most intense working experience was during the first months of Covid lockdowns in Canada.

When not working or "Rainbow-ing", I do all sorts of handwork including quilting, knitting, crocheting, cross stitching, and sewing clothing. I was lucky to live close to two very crafty grandmothers growing up and they taught me well. I've never been married and have no children. However, I am fortunate to be the godmother/adopted godmother to four wonderful children. This is even more fun now that they're adults.

I've been involved in Rainbow for 47 years. I served as Worthy Advisor as a charter member of Westmorland Assembly #23 in Moncton, New Brunswick. I served as Grand Worthy Advisor in Canada 40 years ago this summer. When I moved to Ottawa, I became active with Ottawa Assembly, serving as both a Board member and Mother Advisor. I was appointed to Canada's Grand Executive Committee in 1995 and became chair of that Committee in 1998. From 2000-2002, I served as the only international member of the Rainbow Renewal Task Force. In 2002 I was appointed Supreme Deputy in Canada. I was elected Supreme Inspector in 2012 at Supreme in Grand Rapids, Michigan, which was very special for me as my parents were there to see me installed. Since then, I have served in several Supreme Offices, most recently being elected as Supreme Recorder in 2024. I retired as Supreme Inspector in 2016. Following the resignation of Canada's Supreme Deputy, I resumed my service as Supreme Inspector in Canada in 2022.
